Weasel Wanted

"<u>Wiesel wanted</u>" is a conservation project of the non-profit <u>SWILD</u> in cooperation with the Citizen Science Center Zurich. The goal is to better understand where weasels and their prey have their habitats in Switzerland and how to better protect them in the future. Participants are asked to look at short clips and identify animals visiting camera traps placed in the Zurich region.

The project was launched during this year's Zurich Science Festival <u>Scientifica</u> with a <u>Weasel</u> <u>Challenge</u> that people could join both at the exhibition stand and online: How many animals could a participant identify? Correctly identified weasels gave extra points! 70 persons joined the challenge, providing 6000 identifications, of which 57 were weasels. The winner, Helena Greter from Zurich, is a passionate biologist by profession and in her free time. She told us a little bit about herself, here's her <u>interview</u>.

Do You Know These Snakes?

SNAKE ID CHALLENGE



The Citizen Science Center continues the collaboration with WHO to tackle venomous snake bites. Amateur herpetologists and professional experts will be invited to join the second "Snake ID challenge", and they will be asked to identify thousands of photos of snakes collected on Twitter, and posted from everywhere in the world. The goal is to study the ability of volunteers to correctly identify snakes at the species, genus, or family level, and evaluate how this could be used to help solving a problem that touches more than 5 million people worldwide. **When & where?** November 18 to 28, <u>take part here</u>

Citizen Science and the SDGs

Traditional data sources are not sufficient for measuring the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. New and non-traditional sources of data are required.

A new paper in the *Nature Sustainability* journal (co-authored by the Citizen Science Center) presents a roadmap that outlines how Citizen Science can be integrated into the formal Sustainable Development Goals reporting mechanisms.

The Emotional Entanglements of Smartphones

Research from the University of Zurich Geography Department shows that Smartphones as data collection instruments cause emotions. The effect of such emotions calls for a renewed scrutiny of research ethics, particularly as smartphones increasingly become part of research designs, also in many Citizen Science projects. <u>Summary of the paper</u>
