

## **NEWS FROM THE CENTER**

#### At the Austrian Citizen Science Conference

In June this year some of us travelled to the beautiful mountains of Tyrol, Austria to join the <a href="5th Austrian">5th Austrian</a> <a href="5th Austrian">Citizen Science Conference</a> in Obergurgl. The overall conference theme was "Grenzen and Übergänge", which translates to "Borders and transitions". The rich program included workshops, project sessions, and keynotes. Together with the PWA we offered an interactive workshop on "Citizen Science and Participatory research: two sides of the same medal?" and explored different understandings of the concept of participation with 30 other conference participants. Discussion topics included roles and power structures in Citizen Science projects (more reflection is desirable), co-determination (does not happen automatically but requires awareness and openness in the project design), and the desire for more interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary cooperation.



Several blog entries have been published on the overall conference, for example by the keynote speaker <u>Monica Peters</u> from New Zealand, by the german science communication platform <u>Wissenschaft im Dialog</u>, and by the Austrian <u>Zentrum für Citizen Science</u>.

#### Researchers-in-residence: Lies and Cléa

We currently host two young researchers, Lies and Cléa, who stay with us this summer.



I'm Lies Jacobs, post-doctoral researcher at KU Leuven (division of Geography and tourism). From June to September 2019, I'm undertaking a research stay at the Citizen Science Center (Zurich) and the Citizen Cyberlab (Geneva), funded by the Fund for Scientific Research (FWO). My research focus during this stay will be on applications of in-field citizen science data collection in the Global South as well as exploring the potential of crowdsourcing for disaster mapping in sub-Saharan Africa, using the Crowd4EMS platform.



Hello, my name is Cléa Montanari, and after finishing a bachelors in Biology with a minor in Sustainability studies, I joined the SDG/CS Maximization Group from the Citizen Science Global Partnership in 2018. During my internship, I am undertaking two long term projects. One of the project is the translation of indicator methodologies outlined by the UN so there uptake is more accessible to citizen science. The second project is a study in collaboration with other researchers on how the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development overarching principle to 'Leave no-one behind' is found in different phases of citizen science projects.

Citizen Science Winter School: Transforming research through public participation January 12-17, 2020

Introductory and advanced Citizen Science course for doctoral and post-doctoral students of all faculties (UZH and ETH Zurich)

In the autumn semester 2019, the PWA offers an introductory and advanced course on Citizen Science for doctoral students and postdoctoral researchers at UZH's Graduate Campus. The interactive two-day workshops will tackle the challenges and principles of how citizens can be involved in research projects, and when and why this can be good for your own research. The focus will be on gathering experiences for the planning and implementation of participative design principles for one's own research practice, and the application of adequate methods and tools. The courses will be held in German. More information and registration.

## **International Networking**

This year, the PWA was co-organizer of the Austrian Citizen Science Conference. In addition to the workshop, in which we dealt with overlaps between participatory research and Citizen Science (see report above), we hosted a lecture session. Four interdisciplinary projects and studies were presented under the title "... And beyond". Here you find the abstracts of the lectures.

On the last conference day we met with the D-A-CH working group. D-A-CH stands for Germany, Austria and Switzerland. We would like to intensify networking and cooperate more



with our colleagues in Austria and Germany. For this purpose, we have discussed different possibilities of cooperation. It is still too early to make announcements, but we are very confident that we will come to a fruitful exchange. In Münster, at the Forum Citizen Science, we continue our discussions. A first <u>description of the working group</u> in German is already available.

## Food for dialect lovers: the Wenker project update

The updated version of our project on Swiss German dialects called "Swiss German 1930 / 2020" is now up and running. Working closely together with the research group of Elvira Glaser (Professor for Linguistics at the Department of German at the University of Zurich), we have expanded and simplified the platform that allows passionate volunteers to transcribe and translate the 40 original Wenker phrases from the different regions of Switzerland.

In just a week after the launch, we got more than 900 users (988) and more than 1000 submissions (1300). Keen volunteers reached out on social media to know more about the story behind

the project and linguistic structures, and teachers are trying it out in German classes!
